

What are these Worship Ministry Roles?

LEM = Lay Eucharist Minister who serves both as a Reader and as a Chalice Bearer.

Acolyte = Person who assists the clergy during a worship service or procession. At St. Francis this includes crucifers (cross bearers), Gospel bearers, torch bearers and, on occasion, a children's cross crucifer.

Chalice Bearer = Person who, at Communion, offers one of the two chalices.

Update from the Rev. Tracey Kelly, Rector, Episcopal Church of the Holy Family

In response to the aid that has been received by this church community in Mills River, NC, from St. Francis and many others, we share part of a pastoral letter from the rector of this church, the Rev. Tracey Kelly:



Dear sisters and brothers,

Recently, Hurricane Helene swept across Western North Carolina leaving a devastating swath of destruction in her wake. The Major Disaster Designation in North Carolina alone includes forty counties and the Eastern Band of Cherokee Indians. The extent of loss of life and property is heartbreaking.

What happens after Helene? Help and hope abide.

Within days of the storm, friends, family members, and colleagues began reaching out to us asking how they could contribute financially. I have witnessed the love of neighbors both nearby and from afar wanting to offer help and hope. Although there is an overwhelming amount of work that must be done in the rebuilding of our mountain communities, I know that Church of the Holy Family will make a noteworthy impact in the lives of some of the households and families around us.

Although we are a small church, the people of Holy Family have long embodied God's love with generosity and care for others. I thank you for your continued prayers for the people and communities of Western North Carolina.

Virginia Wing Cadets Finish Second in Drone Meet



Cadets from the Virginia Wing's William P. Knight Composite Squadron teamed up with Scouts from their area July 22-24 at EAA Adventure Oshkosh to finish second nationally in the Beginner Division of the Academy of Model

Aeronautics UAS4STEM drone competition.

The five Beginners Division teams, which also included an Alabama Wing entry consisting of four cadets in the Redstone Composite Squadron and two in the Mountain Lakes Composite Squadron, competed in carrying out the fundamentals of drone programming and flying.

Another team from the Redstone Composite Squadron competed in the Advanced Division, as did a team from the Maryland Wing's St. Mary's Composite Squadron. Those teams worked to develop a mechanism to pick up and transport items to different locations.

UAS4STEM is the Academy for Model Aeronautics'

Unmanned Aerial Systems for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math program.

The second-place finish earned a \$1,000 check for the Virginia entry, competing under the team name "55 Knights."

"I'm in awe of this team and proud of the way they melded together and worked to accomplish such a challenging task," said Capt. Alice Chan, assistant team manager. "From total newbies and even a tree crash mid-mission, it goes to show the capabilities of these cadets and Scouts that they were able to complete the mission successfully and placed second place among other great talents."

"Seeing members from two different American youth organizations, cadets from Civil Air Patrol and Scouts from Scouting America, working together to exercise leadership and teamwork to accomplish the UAS4STEM competition makes me really proud of these future STEM leaders of our nation!" added 1st Lt. Jeff Ye, team manager.

THE IRON WAY

When climbing on natural rock, you seek small ledges to cling onto. In a gym, you grip artificial handholds. On a via ferrata route, you grab iron rungs embedded into the rock. It's like climbing a ladder – and Troops 55 of Great Falls, Virginia, climbed this way to spectacular views.

"Via ferrata" is Italian for "by way of iron." At NROCKS, an outdoor climbing center in eastern West Virginia, the Scouts latched onto a belay cable and climbed a series of paths up vertical rock faces. After a few hours, they gained more than 1,000 feet in elevation.

"It mimics bouldering," says Joy He, 16, a Star Scout. "It was less climbing up and more climbing a distance."

It's an intimidating challenge, but it was one the Scouts were up to.

After a safety briefing, they geared up, hooked their carabiners to the cable and began their ascent. Some paths had 200-foot drops. It's not a race to the top; every movement required focus to safely complete the journey.

"I ignored the height," says Life Scout Thomas Ye, 16. "I just pretended the ground wasn't as far as it appeared to be."

The Scouts had moments to rest and take in beautiful views of the Allegheny Mountains. They even got to cross a suspension bridge that hung 150 feet above the ground. When they reached the top, any nervousness was replaced by a feeling of accomplishment.

"I thought it was really exciting how our troops tried something new and challenging," says Samuel Shadid, 13, a Second Class Scout. "We do really cool outings, and I think via ferrata was adventurous and challenged people's fear of heights. Overall, I thought it was really fun."
